**Huron's Housing and Homelessness Serving System** is a group of agencies and programs that coordinate to provide housing and support to people experiencing housing insecurity and homelessness.

At least 118
people were experiencing
homelessness in Huron
County in June.

In May 2024: 111 People In April 2024: 109 People Of those, 103
people had been chronically
homeless for six months or
more in the last year.

In June, there were 5 more people experiencing chronic homelessness than in May.

**Inflow:** People entering homelessness.

**Outflow:** People exiting homelessness.

Some have been in our system before and some we met for the first time.

## **Monthly Myth Buster:**



Myth: People experiencing homelessness should just find a job.

Fact: There are already people experiencing homelessness who are employed; however, it is much more difficult to find a job while experiencing homelessness. A number of different challenges, such as: lacking a permanent address, not having regular access to showers, barriers to transportation, and other difficulties like mental illness, make it difficult to obtain employment. Even when individuals experiencing homelessness find jobs, they are often part-time or minimum wage positions. This work fails to adequately meet their needs, due to expensive housing costs.

### Shifts from Homelessness to Housing

In June, **3** people moved from homelessness into housing.
